MEET OUR PRESENTERS (alphabetized)

Danielle Barkley and Emily McConnell serve as the South Carolina Ambassadors for Count the Kicks, a project of *Healthy Birth Day, Inc.*, a 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to the prevention of stillbirth and infant death.

Danielle began serving in the Ambassador role in 2015, shortly after her first daughter, Lydia, was stillborn. Emily was honored to join Danielle as the second Ambassador for South Carolina in 2019, just months after her first daughter, Margaret, was stillborn. Both Danielle and Emily were never educated on the importance of tracking fetal movement during the third trimester of pregnancy, and they strongly believe that if they had been, Lydia and Margaret would be here today.

Danielle and Emily strive to honor their daughters every day of their lives, and they want their daughters to make a difference for others. Their goal is to ensure that every expectant parent in South Carolina and beyond knows how important it is to monitor their baby's movements during pregnancy, and contact their doctor right away if they notice a change.

Academically, Danielle holds a Bachelor's degree in Psychology, and Emily holds a Bachelor's degree in English for Secondary Education and a Master's degree in Curriculum and Instruction. Outside of their roles as Ambassadors, Danielle works as a Program Manager of Leadership Development for Sunrise Senior Living, and Emily works as an English teacher at Timberland High School.

Sarah Evanson-Adkinson currently serves as the Instructional Coach at Ralph Chandler Middle School in Simpsonville. She earned a master's degree in English from Stetson University and studied the Humanities at California State University. Ms. Evanson-Adkinson is National Board Certified, a past top 10 finalist for district teacher of the year, and a devoted middle grades educator of 20 years. She is the current Past-President of the South Carolina Association for Middle Level Education (SC-AMLE). She resides in Greenville with her husband, Jeff, and three children, Ethan, Drew, and Olivia and loves listening to the creek in the backyard and watching little league baseball.

Dr. Eleanor Glover Gladney is the Education Associate for Human Services and Family and Consumer Sciences in the South Carolina Department of Education Office of Career and Technology Education. She has been instrumental in restructuring the South Carolina FACS Programs. Dr. Glover Gladney earned a B.S. degree in Family and Consumer Sciences and Master of Science degree in Educational Administration from the University of South Carolina, and a Doctorate of Philosophy in Curriculum and Instruction from Cappella University. She is a member of and actively involved in several professional organizations, coalitions, and communities. She served as president of AAFCS-SCAFCS in 2011-12.

Dr. Susan Gunter, Chair of the Department of Art and Design, has been active in the field of arts and education for 30 years. She was recently the recipient of the 2015 Higher Education Level Award by the South Carolina Art Education Association. As a classroom art teacher for 21 years, she received numerous awards including Union High School Teacher of the Year, Union County Teacher of the Year, Dorman High School Teacher of the Year, SC Art Education Association Secondary Art Teacher of the Year, and SC Art Education Association Art Educator of the Year. She authored *The History of the SC Art Education Association* (2004); "Understanding and Sustaining Change in Art Education," *NAEA Advisory*, National Art Education Association (Spring 2002); "Membership Recruitment" – *Emphasis* magazine published by the South Carolina Education Association, (September 2002); co-authored with A. Ray Doughty *The History of Arts Education in South Carolina: A Brief Retrospective*, The South Carolina Alliance for Arts Education (May 2002); and her doctoral dissertation: *The History of Discipline-based Art Education in South Carolina and Its Impact on Southern Rural Female Middle-School Students*, University of South Carolina (2000). Dr. Gunter was recently appointed historian to the South Carolina Education Association and serves on the SCEA Archives Committee. Dr. Gunter has taught courses at Converse for the Education Department and for the Art Education program due to her experiences in Educational Administration as a middle school principal, Adult Education Director, Alternative School Director, Fine Arts Coordinator, Family Literacy Director and art teacher. She has teaching and administrative experience at all levels. As a practicing artist, she exhibits locally and regionally. She is a member of the Union County Arts Council, Cherokee Alliance for Visual Artists, Spartanburg Artists' Guild and a former Guild Gallery Director. She is a past board member of the Union Carnegie Library, the Union Chamber of Commerce, and the Upstate WIB Youth Advisory Council. Dr. Gunter has served on the board of the Children's Advocacy Center of Spartanburg, Cherokee, and

Union Counties and was an art consultant to several schools and districts. She also served as vice-chair of the Friends of the Pearl Fryer Topiary Garden.

Dr. Ethel G. Jones is currently serving as the Director for the School of Human Ecology at Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, Louisiana, and on the Board of the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences. *She has been recently asked to serve on the Governor's Office of Boards and Commissions as a member to the "Empowering Families to Live Well Louisiana Council"*. Her commitment to FCS began at South Carolina State University (SCSU) during her baccalaureate study and it continued at Iowa State University (ISU) during her graduate study at the master's level. Following a distinguished career in secondary education, she became a visiting faculty member at her Alma Mater. After one year on the faculty, she was selected for the Faculty Development Program and returned to ISU for doctoral study. Upon earning the Ph.D. in Family and Consumer Sciences Education, she returned to SCSU and provided leadership as professor, advisor, collegiate committee member, and program administrator. Dr. Jones has a significant record of core accomplishments and distinctions from having served as President of SCAFCS President of the 1890 Council of Administrators in Family and Consumer Sciences, President of the National Association of Teacher Education for FCS, Chair of the Council for Accreditation for AAFCs and President of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference.

Matina Kazameas is a public health professional whose focus is on childhood obesity prevention. She has worked on the NJ Child Health Study for 2.5 years completing primary data collection in urban corner-stores located in food deserts. She completed her fieldwork on Evaluation of Go NAP SACC (Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment in Childcare Centers) in 23 West Virginia early childcare centers, and now works with LiveWell Greenville specifically with Early Childhood, Out of School Time and Worksite Wellness Initiatives.

Connie Lanzl accepted the position of president in August of 2010 and is responsible for the overall leadership and management of JA programs serving schools in Greenville, Spartanburg, Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties. By working with schools, businesses, and volunteers, JA provides hands-on, experiential lessons focusing on work readiness, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy for students in grades K-12. In order to impact as many students as possible, Lanzl spends much of her time building relationships with individuals in business and education, securing sponsorships, and elevating awareness in all five counties. The overall vision is to help drive the economy – and therefore all the good things that follow – by helping to develop a workforce that is prepared, knowledgeable, entrepreneurial, and financially astute.

Lanzl came to Greenville in 1997 when her husband, Steve, accepted a job as Bowater's CIO. Shortly after arriving, she continued her career in educational fundraising first at Camperdown Academy and then for the last twelve years at Christ Church Episcopal School as director of the development office. Prior to moving to South Carolina, Lanzl headed development offices in an independent school in Philadelphia and an international school in Tokyo, Japan, and has done work as a consultant for capital and endowment campaigns.

Paige Selking is the Ending the Silence Project Director for NAMI South Carolina tasked with expanding the program throughout South Carolina. While she has a background in social services, her focus shifted to mental health in 2015 as the result of her husband and son living with combat related PTSD. In addition to her work with Ending the Silence, she teaches Family-to-Family and Provider Education for NAMI Mid-Carolina and is a member of multiple committees working on youth and Veterans issues. She has a B.A. in Sociology.

Billie Jean Shaw, a Multimedia Journalist from Manning, South Carolina, is a reporter at WCNC-TV in Charlotte, North Carolina, specializing in general assignment reporting in South Carolina. Billie Jean joined WCNC in April 2017 after spending time with the NBC affiliate in Columbia, South Carolina. While there, she excelled in many roles including morning reporter, general assignment reporter and midday anchor. Known for her ability to easily connect with viewers, Billie Jean landed several exclusives while in Columbia.

In 2015, she was one of the first reporters to the scene of the tragic shooting at Mother Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, SC.

Just hours after the devastating crimes, Billie Jean was the first to report the details surrounding the shooting before any local or national network. Months later, in an exclusive interview, Billie Jean sat down with the adult survivors as they gave a chilling account of the horrifying night.

Billie Jean graduated from Winthrop University with a B.A. in mass communications with a minor in marketing. During her time at Winthrop, she worked in Washington, DC covering political news on Capitol Hill and issues in the community.

After graduation, Billie Jean was hired as an Assignment Desk Editor and Digital Journalist at the FOX affiliate in Charlotte. While at FOX, Billie Jean was the first to report on the historic Civil Rights case of the "Friendship Nine," breaking the news that a judge would overturn the men's 54-year-old convictions. It was a compelling and emotional story that went on to capture national headlines.

In 2016, Billie Jean was the first reporter to speak with the family and attorney of Keith Scott. Scott was fatally shot by a Charlotte-Mecklenberg police officer sparking several nights of protests.

In 2017, the South Carolina Senate recognized Billie Jean's work by issuing a proclamation applauding her professionalism and service to the community.

When she's not reporting, Billie Jean enjoys spending time with her family and volunteering.

She is a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. and the National Association of Black Journalists.

Susan Spencer graduated from The University of Toledo with a degree in Theatre and Communications.

After volunteering for several years for Junior Achievement in 2000, Susan Spencer started working for Junior Achievement of Upstate South Carolina. Susan held the position of the Events and Marketing Director for several years and currently is the Director of Education and Volunteers. She is responsible for overseeing the implementation of the Junior Achievement programs in the Upstate in grades Kindergarten through High School. She works with the educators and the volunteers.

Susan has a passion for changing the lives of students by preparing them for the real world and giving them the tools they need to be successful. She enjoys training and preparing volunteer role models to teach in the classrooms.

Susan is involved with several non-profits and has been heavily involved with the PTA and the SIC at the schools where her three children attended. She currently serves on the RECAB Board, Crime Stoppers Board and has served on the Moonlight and Magnolias Committee for The American Cancer Society for eight years. In addition, she is a member of the The Pleasantburg Rotary Club where she has served as President, served as Program Chair for 9 years and is currently on the Social committee.

Jerri Ward, M.Ed is a retired counselor, behavior interventionist, and corrections officer, (aka Middle School Teacher). She retired from teaching after 28 years in Alabama, moved to Greenville and immediately went right back to teaching for the next 4 years. She did long term substitutions for Greenville County for 3 years and now works as the Receptionist and Administrative Assistant to the Missions Pastor at Edwards Road Baptist Church. She has presented at The Nuts and Bolts Conference in Destin, FL as well as The National Middle School Conference in Denver, CO. She volunteers her time with SWITCH conducting AWARENESS presentations whenever she can.

The second and third "PipeUp" efforts are to create better collaborations with: our state Association of Teachers of Family and Consumer Sciences (SCATFCS) officers, and; our state Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (SCFCCCLA) Board members and advisors. 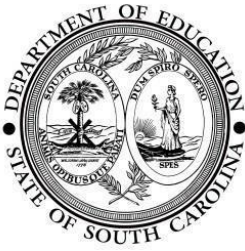
