MEET OUR PRESENTERS

(Special Note: Presenters are in the order in which they present.)



Mr. Dominick Sanders: Dominick Sanders is currently the Computer Science Supervisor for the state of South Carolina Education Department. In this role, he is responsible for k-12 computer science education programs and professional development across the state. As a former computer science teacher and national leader, he brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to share with the education sector. As a teacher, one of his proudest moments as a teacher was during the 2019-2020 school year. For the Advanced Placement Computer Science exam, he helped his school secure a 70.8% pass rate. More scholars passed the exam and had an overall higher average score than the state of Tennessee. His female and Black and Latinx scholars had a higher passing rate than the state and global average.

His true passion is helping others and giving back by inspiring and encouraging as many underserved students as he possibly can. One of his favorite quotes is “You can be what you can’t see.” Keeping that quote in mind, in 2019 he founded Xposure STEM. Xposure STEM is a nonprofit organization designed to empower, expose, and equip underserved boys and girls to become leading contributors to the world of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. Dominick is currently a doctoral student at Vanderbilt University studying educational leadership and public policy. He holds a Master’s degree from Relay Graduate School for Education and a B.S. in Computer Science from Jackson State University. He is also currently an alumnus of the Computer Science Teachers Association (CSTA) Equity Fellowship.



Dr. Katrina Maxwell: Katrina Maxwell is an Associate Professor of Human Services at Saint Leo University. She earned a Ph.D. and an MS in Family Relations from Florida State University and a BS in Child Development from South Carolina State University. While pursuing her doctorate, she served as a student therapist to individuals, couples, and families at FSU’s Marriage and Family Therapy Center training under a leading therapist in the field. She has worked in the field of Human Services for over 20 years. In 2021, she collaborated with colleagues to publish a chapter entitled, Cultural competency, in the e-book, Community Partnering for the Advocacy of Mental Health.

In 2020, she published an article, Job Burnout: Causes and Prevention from the Human Services Perspective. The article highlighted the importance of self-care. Prior to joining Saint Leo University’s faculty, she was an assistant professor for over five years where she taught family relations and individual and family development courses to undergraduate and graduate students at South Carolina State University.



Dr. Eleanor Glover-Gladney: Dr. Glover Gladney is an Education Associate in the Office of Career and Technical Education at the South Carolina Department of Education. She is a graduate of South Carolina State University, the University of South Carolina, and Capella University. Dr. Gladney is a 47-year veteran in education. She manages the Human Services/Family and Consumer Sciences Program of Study. She has one son, Ryan Glover Sr., and enjoys spending time with him and his family – wife, Tanisha, and sons – Ryan Jr. and Brayden. She begins every day giving praises to the Lord for allowing her to see another day and sees every day as another day for growth and renewal.



Mrs. Barbara Scully: Barbara Scully from the Connect FCS Ed presents a fresh take on recruitment and support for today's modern Home Economics educators in the Family & Consumer Sciences (FCS) classroom. Sharing insightful stories, strategies, and resources in a fun, sustainable, and practical way. Dr. Meirav Goldhour: Meirav Goldhour is a Professor and Program Coordinator of Interior Design at Converse University. She is a University of Georgia alumnus, has graduated with an MFA from the Department of Interior Design, Lamar Dodd School of Art, and has completed a professional certificate in Historic through the College of Environment and Design, UGA.

Goldhour served for two years in the IDF (Israel Defense Force) as a Physical Trainer-Combat Support, in an elite paratroopers' unit. Following her military service, she pursued her undergraduate degree in Interior Architecture in Israel.

Her graduate thesis topic focused on design for mental health, with the emphasis on the effects of the designed environment on people with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Moreover, Meirav is currently enrolled in the Professional leadership Ed.D at Converse and plans to publish a similar topic related to Design and Mental Health.

Goldhour gained experience in community outreach while working for Archway Partnership, redesigning Adaptive reuse buildings, taking place in various communities in the state of Georgia. She adopts this approach into her classroom at Converse, where students receive the opportunity to design projects for “real” clients in the local and non-local communities. These past projects included collaboration with the Spartanburg Area of Mental Health, the Greenville Jewish Center, and a Brewery design in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Goldhour’s teaching style integrates sophisticated design software, also well incorporated in the architecture and design industry. The software is offered as a tool for students to explore their projects and present them professionally.



Mr. Phillip Ford: Phillip Ford is an advocate, public relations professional, eternal optimist, and is the owner of The Ford & Ford Group. A native of Orangeburg, South Carolina, he attended The Citadel, where he majored in Political Science with a focus on American Government. After spending nearly a decade out of state working on Presidential to City Council races across the country, Phil wanted to come back home to help his state and community. Phil started The Ford & Ford Group in an effort to help move South Carolina to be a more just and equitable state. With more than 20 years of experience in politics, nonprofit consulting, and community organization, Phillip believes in a grassroots approach to making change happen.



Mr. Cedric Wright: Cedric Wright was born in Bronx, New York but was raised in Aiken, South Carolina. After high school, he attended South Carolina State University where he majored in Spanish Education. Upon the completion of college, he taught at Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School, Howard Middle School, and Rivelon Elementary School in Orangeburg, South Carolina, and completed additional teaching studies at the University of Montezuma. After leaving the teaching profession, he worked at 1890 Research and Extension while completing his MBA degree and coauthoring a book titled *Jump Start*. Feeling the yearn to still teach, he taught for several more years at Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College in the Business Department and Camden Military Academy. Currently, he works as a Program Assistant/Outreach Coordinator for the SC Department of Consumer Affairs. He is married to YaShunte Wright and they have three children, Kalah, Aaron, and Madison.



Ms. Kimberly Kelso: Kimberly Kelso and is the coordinator for the national and higher education alternative teacher preparation programs at the South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE).
